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### It's a key moment for climate action join the mass lobby on 18th September

People from all over Scotland will gather at the Scottish Parliament and Dynamic Earth in Edinburgh on 18<sup>th</sup> September to tell our MSPs: this is a moment for leadership that protects what matters most — our health, our nature, our communities, our climate, and our future. You are being asked to join them.

Thousands of people met their MPs in Westminster in July. The Edinburgh event is connected with that, making sure people in Scotland can meet their decision makers too, because most climate policy is devolved.

With a Scottish election just round the corner next May, and a new Climate Change Plan being prepared, this is a critical time for MSPs to be hearing from us.

Members of Justice & Peace Scotland, in addition to many others across the climate action network as well as any concerned individuals, will be asking MSPs to use all opportunities to act with urgency to help us build a fairer, healthier, more stable and resilient future for everyone by:

- Making our homes warmer and more energy efficient
- Supporting us to secure jobs and the skills we need to deliver these jobs
- Transforming our food system so that everyone has access to healthy, sustainable food
- Enabling better public transport and safer streets for walking, wheeling and cycling
- Reducing poverty and supporting those most impacted by climate impacts
- Ensuring a thriving natural environment that supports our health, wellbeing, and livelihoods for generations to come.

This has been narrowly focused on maintaining and upgrading the countries' nuclear arsenals since the signing of the Lancaster House Treaties.

The date of 1st November has been chosen for the conference, and walk to Lancaster House and vigil outside Downing Street, to coincide with the 15-year anniversary of the Treaties. The two nations this summer reaffirmed their commitment to logistics-sharing over their nuclear deterrents for the stated purpose of maintaining peace. This is a concept the conference will seek to challenge, and instead promote a possible framework for genuine peace.

More than £300 billion globally has been spent on nuclear weapons over the past five years. Leading to "shameful" reductions on how the world's treasures could be deployed for the betterment of people and the planet.

That was one of the messages delivered by Archbishop William Nolan at the No To Nuclear Weapons peace gathering at the South Gate of HM Naval Base Clyde at Faslane at the start of this month. Organised by Justice & Peace Scotland it served as a commemoration of the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki which is estimated to have caused more than 210,000 deaths.

The event was led by Archbishop of Glasgow, also Bishop-President of Justice & Peace Scotland, Rt Rev Rosie Frew, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, and Most Rev Mark Strange, Primus of the Scotlish Episcopal Church. They were joined by representatives from the Quakers, the Iona Community, the United Reformed Church, Pax Christi Scotland and the Glasgow Worker as almost 150 people stood in solidarity to renew a shared commitment to the common good and the flourishing of creation.

The group came together for prayer and reflection on the immorality of possessing nuclear weapons at a time when conflicts in the Middle East and Eastern Europe rage and the threat posed by these soon-to-be upgraded and expanded stocks in the UK is greater than in recent memory. The current generation of such weapons – held by nine countries - is understood to be 80 times more powerful than those dropped in Japan in 1945.

"You can't spend billions on nuclear weapons and then spend billions on other things as well," said Archbishop Nolan. "And shamefully, the British government has reduced the foreign aid budget and they are going to put that money, they told us, towards military spend. It shameful that should happen – especially at a time when so many people throughout the world are badly affected by climate change. And badly affected by war as well. War that is fuelled by the arms supplied by so many nations, including Britain itself, with weapons of mass destruction not acting as deterrents but instead creating an arms race.

"So when we stand here and highlight the futility of nuclear weapons we are also highlighting the evil that they are causing because so much money is being directed into this facility that could be directed into saving lives and doing good throughout the world. And we are also highlighting the futility of trying to achieve peace through weapons on mass destruction. We can only achieve peace by reconciliation and friendship."





# Red line for Palestine

The plight of the Palestinian people was uppermost in the hearts and minds of those attending the National Justice and Peace Network Conference in Swanwick, last month.

The conference theme of Just Peace - challenging the concept that only violence can solve conflict - could only trigger images of the horrors unfolding in Gaza. Representatives, including a group of Justice & Peace Scotland commissioners, gathered in red at the centre for a symbolic photograph to highlight the red lines that the Israeli government has crossed in its flagrant disregard of international law as war crimes are carried out in a daily basis.

As the Latin patriarch of Jerusalem, Cardinal Pierbattista Pizzaballa, said of the place of Christ's birth: "It really does seem that our Holy Land, which preserves the highest revelation and manifestation of God, is also the place of the highest manifestation of Satan's power."

Pope Leo XIV recently called for a "halt to the barbarity" that has witnessed indiscriminate bombing of the strip, forced displacement, the targeting of civilians and journalists, and deliberate starvation across the past two years. Unconscionably, the ordinarily cautious and respected Integrated Food Security Phase Classification (IPC) body having recently declared a Level 5 "catastrophic" famine - Israeli government-made - that has left more than 500,000 starving and been responsible for 600 deaths of the almost 62,000 Gazans killed. At a time when Israel only last week approved further illegal settlements in the occupied West Bank that would effectively cut it off from East Jerusalem.

Choosing Fair Trade products supports ethical and sustainable practices in global trade, ensuring fairer prices, decent working conditions, and environmental sustainability for farmers and workers in the Global South.

Scottish Fair Trade, of which Justice & Peace Scotland is a longstanding member, recognises, on its own, changing shopping habits isn't sufficient to redress the effects of a global economic system that is not working. Christians from across Glasgow and beyond gathered for a celebration of welcome and sanctuary as part of Refugee Festival Scotland in June. The service at The Immaculate Conception Church in Maryhill, organised in partnership with Justice & Peace Scotland, as a member of Scotlish Faith Action for Refugees (SFAR), brought together almost 100 people from a host of different countries. These included Iran, El Salvador, the Philippines, Nigeria, Ukraine, Uganda and Eritrea. As well as the Catholic Church, represented were the Church of Scotland, Scotlish Episcopal Church, Methodist Church, Quakers, Salvation Army as well as others.

The service featured songs, poems and prayers. A warm welcome was offered by Father Jim Lawlor of the host church and the sermon was delivered Father Andriy Chornenko of the Ukrainian Catholic Parish of Glasgow. Father Andriy shared a reflection on the Good Samaritan, urging all to "go and do likewise" for the stranger in our midst.

Two young people from the parish, sisters Ruth and Rita Nansasi spoke of finding sanctuary and welcome in Scotland. While Esther Moodie, coordinator of Scotlish Faiths Action for Refugees, challenged the congregation to consider how they can get involved in refugee integration.

The service concluded with food prepared by the community, featuring dishes from El Salvador, the Philippines and more. Refugee Festival Scotland (13–22 June) celebrates the culture, creativity and contributions of people who have made Scotland their home.


### Plea to break down barriers and see the humanity in others

Archbishop William Nolan implored for an end to the dehumanising of those who come to this country and find themselves in immigration detention centres as he addressed June's Dignity Not Detention solidarity gathering at Dungavel.

A disturbingly racist rhetoric is being whipped up around nonnationals who happen to be persons of colour in the UK. And the Bishop-President of Justice & Peace Scotland - organisers of the event along with Scottish Peace Network - called on this to be challenged. "They are not a number, not a statistic, they are people," he said. "And we have to look those people in the eyes and see human beings."

Those inside centres such as Dungavel, treated differently from nationals simply because of their origins, do not know how long they will remain there as their cases are heard, with the UK the only country in Europe where unlimited detention exists. Justice & Peace Scotland will never turn its back on the stranger and, thanks to tremendous support from the Motherwell J&P commission, gathered in sizeable numbers, in torrential rain, to demonstrate that compassion.
